- **Eva Beaujouan**

Eva Beaujouan is an Associate Professor at the Department of Demography at the University of Vienna. She studied applied mathematics and demography at the Université Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne and received her PhD from INED in 2009. She was a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Southampton and later at the Vienna Institute of Demography (Wittgenstein Centre). Eva Beaujouan studies fertility and family change across the high-income countries for women and men, with a focus on the shift towards later fertility. In 2020, she has been awarded an ERC consolidator grant BIC.LATE to study the Biological, Individual and Contextual factors of fertility recovery. She also received an FWF stand-alone project “Later Fertility in Europe” (Jan. 2019-June 2023), to study the consequences of childbearing postponement for fertility levels in low fertility countries. In 2022 she was awarded Jan M. Hoem Award for Social Policy and Family Demography by the European Association for Population Studies.

- **Jiřina Kocourková**

Jiřina Kocourková obtained her Ph.D. in demography at Charles University in Prague in the Czech Republic, where she was subsequently habilitated. Currently she is the head of the Department of Demography and Geodemography at Charles University. Her main research interest includes fertility trends and patterns, family planning and assisted reproduction, population and family policy. She has been Principal Investigator of national projects and participated in international projects. Now she is a member of the Management Committee of COST Action project Sustainability@Leave. She has published more than 80 publications and presented papers at more than 50 international and national conferences. Besides, she provides expertise for the Czech Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs. She acted as a Member of the Expert Committee for Family Policy and currently she is a Member of the Evaluation Committee of the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs. She is also a member of the Czech Accreditation Bureau for Higher Education and a Member of the Evaluation Panel of the Czech Science Foundation.

- **Stanisława Golinowska**

Stanisława Golinowska is a Professor of Economics, author of well-known multidisciplinary works also in the field of social policy, labour market and health sciences. She has headed research institutes (Institute of Labour and Social Affairs in Warsaw and the Institute of Public Health at the Jagiellonian University Collegium Medicum in Krakow), national and international scientific projects and participated in advisory bodies of national (Council for Social and Economic Strategy) and international (UN) authorities. She co-founded one of the first analytical *think tanks* in Poland - CASE Scientific *Foundation*. In recent years, she has

organised, designed and co-authored a comprehensive textbook on public health, taking into account its social and environmental dimensions.

- **Wiktoria Wróblewska**

Wiktoria Wróblewska is a Professor at Warsaw School of Economics (SGH) in the Institute of Statistics and Demography, specialist in demography and health demography, Member of the Committee on Demographic Studies of the Polish Academy of Sciences, Poland. She holds lectures at the bachelor's and master's studies as well as the doctoral school at SGH. Her scientific interests focus on demographic processes, their determinants and measurement, as well as social statistics, inequalities in health and reproductive health. She is the author and co-author of numerous publications in the area of population processes and demography of health.

- **Krzysztof Tymicki**

Krzysztof Tymicki is a Professor at the Warsaw School of Economics in Poland. He is a distinguished demographer and social scientist specializing in the analysis of demographic processes and population studies. His research interests encompass a wide range of topics within demography, including fertility patterns, mortality rates, family dynamics, and aging populations. He has contributed significantly to the understanding of demographic changes in the Central and Eastern Europe, with numerous publications in prestigious international journals. His work often employs advanced statistical techniques to model and predict demographic trends, providing valuable insights for policymakers and social planners. Prof. Tymicki is an active member of various professional organizations, such as the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP) and the European Association for Population Studies (EAPS).

- **Anna Matysiak**

Anna Matysiak is a Professor at the Faculty of Economic Sciences at the University of Warsaw, where she directs the Interdisciplinary Center for Labor Market and Family Dynamics (LABFAM). She is also Vice President of the European Association for Population Studies (EAPS) and Editor-in-Chief of Demographic Research. Anna Matysiak received her PhD in Economics in 2009 and her Habilitation in the same field in 2017 from the Warsaw School of Economics. Her training in demography included a period at the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research from 2005 to 2007. Prior to her current position, she was Assistant Professor at the Institute of Statistics and Demography at the Warsaw School of Economics from 2009 to 2013 and a researcher at the Vienna Institute of Demography at the Austrian Academy of Sciences from 2013 to 2019. In 2018, she received the Dirk J. van de Kaa Award for Social Demography from the European Association for Population Studies, which

recognizes her outstanding achievements in social demography and the interrelationship between population dynamics and social change. In 2019, she won the prestigious ERC Consolidator grant “Globalization-and Technology-Driven Labor Market Change and Fertility” (LABFER). Her main areas of expertise include family and fertility change, the interplay between family dynamics and labor market transitions, male and female employment, gender relations and family and employment policies.

- **Monika Mynarska**

Monika Mynarska is an Associate Professor at the Institute of Psychology, UKSW and a researcher at the Institute of Statistics and Demography at the Warsaw School of Economics, the coordinator of the Generations and Gender Programme in Poland. Her research focuses on family and fertility issues, including the decision-making processes related to union formation, marriage, and childbearing. She has extensively studied the motivations, desires, and intentions behind childbearing, as well as the determinants of childlessness.
